What is Pathways to Progress

Mid-Barrier Services A program in which individuals experiencing homelessness are provided with intensive case management, basic needs are met to support stability.

Pathways to Progress

Advanced Shelter Services Phase 4: Client have completed Phases 1-3 and are now ready for their next steps

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Clients must complete an intake process

Pathways to Progress



Clients must agree to participate in the CUH Shelter Program.



Clients must consistently demonstrate that they are working toward their goals.




Each intake, case plan and goals are evaluated and developed on a case-by-case basis, structured to meet, and address the needs of the environment and the clients.


Intake

Intake: Gathering of basic demographic information as well as the gathering of information that is relevant to determine if a client is ready for a mid-high barrier shelter stay.

Information such as

- Mental health history
- Substance abuse use
- Physical capabilities
- Criminal background





Intensive Services

- Clients are assigned to a case management team who they have three direct contacts with each week
- Clients receive 24/7 support from Life Skills Staff
- Staff operate using a trauma informed care, client-centered approach
- The team assists clients completing their Phase goals and any goals the client identifies
- The case manager often accompanies clients to meetings and appointments in support of their goals/needs.
- The staff to client ratio is generally lower

Four Phases

Each phase is progressive and builds on each other

Each phase requires new skills

Each phase promotes stability

Four Phases

Focus Points

- Substance Use Recovery
- Mental Health Assessments
- Physical Health Needs
- Financial Health Needs
- Housing Needs
- Life Skills

The Need Expansion of Services

Currently serve up to 16 mid-barrier clients in two residential homes

The Need

Need to expand to a location that can serve up to 25 clients in a trauma informed location and a step-up process

Need to have space for support groups and meetings

CURRENT OPPORTUNITY & PROPOSAL

Mid-barrier Campus 1207 S Mattis Ave, Champaign

- 12,000 square feet
- Space to house Phases 1, 2, and 3 clients
- Space to house intensive case management and support group activities and classes
- Space to bring in community member to be part of a client's pathway to progress
- Space for CUH's administrative services located in same location as program.

Costs to Make Campus a Reality

Purchase price - \$1,125,000, secured \$795,000, need \$330,000

Financial Renovation Costs - \$550,000, secured \$300,000, need \$250,000

Annual Operating Support (excludes case management) \$925,000, projected revenues \$675,000, need \$250,000 (HACC possibly \$150,000)
